



From the Shed



First, I would like to thank everyone who has given materials I bring to the meetings new homes and new life as baskets and art! Cookie Hanson was wonderful and took some supplies for her students to experiment with as well. And Willie Ziegler was able to find someone who was thrilled to pay shipping and take all the Nantucket materials that were donated to us. Thank you Willie for taking on that task!

Thus far, we have emptied one large bin of materials and downsized our stash of baskets. The storage unit now has floor space and more room to turn around so thank you very much! But never fear, we still have plenty of supplies to share, and I will continue to bring them to meetings. We also have materials brought to meetings that are not from storage. In March, Peggy Blessing brought various shapes and sizes of beautiful donated gourds she is re-homing. And Carol Lang had two terrific photography lights that were offered at a bargain basement price. You just never know what will pop up at a meeting!

In addition to our orphan pile, we have begun to occasionally have a door prize with a few of the nicest baskets by Camilla Filancia and Misti Washington. We will be saving some choice ones for a silent auction we are considering for Basket Day in August.

I am including a picture of my latest "shed" project in progress. First, I used a D handle and oval rim for the frames. I got the idea from one of the free books called "Legend of the Bushwhacker Basket" by Wetherbee & Taylor. Some of the baskets in this book begin with square bottoms and end with round rims. I found the material to lash them, which looks rather like cane, in the storage unit stash of goodies and experimented with a pattern called Winking Eye I found in another free book from storage - "New Lashings and Improvements to Old Favorites" by Malone. These books



are in my personal collection now! Who knows where this project will go from here, but it sure is fun so far. I hope that anyone who tried some new materials will also share their work and ideas by sending pictures for the next newsletter or bringing items for show and share to the meetings.



The Library Corner

The library has taken much (much) longer than anticipated, and I appreciate everyone's patience! But the shelves now have face frames and the stain is being applied. For those of you who even knew or might have wondered, Ron and I have been completely remodeling his office and during that time took in the library to be part of it. So, after installing a new window, baseboards and closet, Ron decided that he wanted to build custom shelves. And here we are! We have every confidence that the library will be up and running soon (fingers crossed).

In the meantime, I have been rehoming duplicate free books from storage at the meetings and took some myself for my personal "basket library." I just finished reading "Legend of the Bushwacker Basket" by Martha Wetherbee and Nathan Taylor. It's a short read that chronicles what little is known about a community of basket weavers who lived in the hills outside of Taghkanic (pronounced Ta-kon-ik), New York from the 1700's to the present. Descendants from these expert weavers still live in the area and make baskets, but not in the huge numbers they once did. There is only speculation about where these weavers came from originally, and why they settled that area, but at that time it was an excellent source of materials they used - ash, hickory, oak and maple. There is also no clear reason why most of the weavers stopped making baskets, but a combination of compulsory schooling in town, decline of the forests, the creation of plastics and other factors likely contributed. Unfortunately, because they lived in isolated communities, they were often characterized by townsfolk and the press as lazy, illiterate, inbred and strange, which is why they were called Bushwackers. In reality, they were business men and women who created some of the best baskets ever made. Many of their baskets have survived over a hundred years or more, a testament to the quality of their construction.

The baskets of Taghkanic were originally carried to market on long poles and later shipped to areas around the northeast. They are beautiful, practical, useful, unadorned baskets often confused with Shaker baskets, yet different in many ways. All aspects of the baskets were considered when deciding exactly what the purpose would be, with a focus on durability. Double bottoms, double lashings, wide rims and the use of mixed woods were common design features. Ash for lashings and weavers due to its flexibility, oak and hickory for uprights, rims and handles for strength. All designs were made with tension in mind. Three basic basket types were made: round bottom/round top, square bottom/round top, rectangular bottom/oval top. Apart from some other unique features such as the placement of swing handles, a Taghkanic basket is identified by their distinctive rims (thicker horizontally than they are tall), mix of woods, ratio of weavers to uprights, double lashings and round or oval tops. The finish of the baskets is not polished but has a slightly rough appearance, which fits with the ruggedness of the design and adds to the beautiful nature of the Taghkanic craft. There are many Taghkanic baskets photos online you can check out and be inspired by!
